So I will have a big report for everyone to read next issue. This will be good time for me because I will finally get to meet that Italian player in 1983S who is trying to eat me for lunch. This Arnawoodian guy sure knows how to hurt a poor French player.

Rod Walker in his zine EREHWON printed some startents that I made to him. This was with my permission of course. It reflects the way I feel toward HOBBY FUEDING. I will reprint that for you here. While we are on the subjects of fueding, don't forget to look at the page with the new zine register on it and please don't forget to read my comments on the bottom of the page.

Howard Christie, editor of STABBACK, writes.

It's a pity that some people still do not get that point.



- 1. The 1976 Diplomacy rules are used except as follows.
- 2. The game begins in Spring 1939. Player countries and intial units are as follows:

FRANCE: F Brest, A Paris, A Marseilles, A Algeria

ENGLAND: F London, F Edinburgh, A Liverpool, A Egypt

GERMANY: F Kiel, A Berlin, A Munich, A Prussia

ITALY: F Sicily, A Rome, A Venice, A Libya

RUSSIA: F Lenigard, A Moscow, A Sevastople, A Kuihyshev

- 3. Finland, Poland, Rumania, Spain, Sweden, Turkey, and Yugoslavia are occupied by an army in civil disorder. This army represents that countries armed forces.
- 4. Kiel, Denmark, and Turkey act as Kiel, Denmark, and Constantinople, respectively, in standard Diplomacy for movement purposes.
- 5. Spain and Morocco, Sicily and Naples, Egypt and Middle East, Turkey and Bulgaria, Greece, Denmark and Sweden these eleven spaces act as brigges for movement of armies and fleets.
- 6. The nortern portion of Lenigard becomes a new province, Archangel.
 This contains a special Build Center (not a supply center) for Russia.
 If Russia still owns Lenigard, and she is otherwise entitled to arbuild, she may build a unit in Archangel.
- 7. The country of Persia is also a special Build Center for Russia. If Russia still owns any one of her home supply centers, and she is entitled to a build, she may build a unit in Persia. Persia is not a supply center.
- 8. An Alantic High Ocean Box is added at the SW edge of the board. It borders 4 bodies of water, as indicated by the map and 1 land province, Greenland. Any number of fleets may be in the AOB at any one time, so that fleets in the AOB may not be attacked and dislodged. Fleets may be supported from the AOB to any of the areas that it could legally be moved to. A fleet may travel from the AOB to the AFB freely, even if there was another fleet present there.
- 9. An African High Ocean Box has been added at the 8 edge of the board. It borders 3 bodies of water, as indicated by the map. Any number of fleets may be in the AFO at any one time, so that fleets in the AFO may not be attacked and dislodged. Fleets may be supported from the AFO to any of the areas that it could legally be moved to. A fleet may travel from the AFB to the AOB freely, even if there was another fleet present.
- 10. Finland, Persia, and Spain have a North and South coast

- 11. Egypt has a North and East coast.
- 12. Middle East has a West and East coast.
- 13. Western Med. borders on the Mid Altantic and South Alantic, and visa versa.
- 14. A fleet in the AOB or AFO may not support a fleet into any area that the AOB or AFO may move, but a fleet could support a fleet from the AOB or AFO into an area that it could move.
- 15. Hungary does not border Poland, and Poland does not border Hungary.
- 16. A country can build in any of its home supply centers. This includes Algeria, Libya, and Egypt.
- 17. The only space on the board that is impassable is Switzerland
- 18. The total amount of supply centers are 39. The victory criterion for 1939 IV is 20 supply centers.






